

How many words do students need to know?



The problem

- Elementary (A2) students 'know' about 1000 words
- Intermediate (B1/B2) students 'know' about 2,500 words
- Upper intermediate + (B2/C1) students need to 'know' about 7,500 – 9,000 words
- The 5,000+ new words they need to know don't come 'for free'


Towards a solution

- Make students aware of the issue and encourage effective word-learning strategies
- Provide memorable encounters with words
- Recycle encounters over and over and over and over and over and over again

Encourage effective word-learning strategies

- Guessing from context
- Better dictionary use
- Techniques for memorising new words
- Using word cards paper or digital
- Extensive reading & listening
- Watching videos with subtitles
- Learning the high frequency affixes
- Recording vocabulary in effective ways
